PLAN STRUCTURE


DPP recently developed guidance for a consistent plan structure and format to be used across all plans.

monitoring, and implementation.



PLAN COMPONENTS

Component	Description
Introduction	1-2 page overview of the purpose of the plan update; summary of the "big ideas" (key goals and policies to achieve the vision)
Vision Statement	Narrative description of desired future conditions in 25 years
Guiding Principles	Broad themes woven throughout the plan, with icons correlated to policy topics
Topical Chapters	 9-12 chapters Topics vary between DPs/SCPs Some topics are cross-cutting, some are categorical (e.g., Housing, Parks & Open Space, Mobility & Connectivity, etc.) Chapter Components: Introduction: Existing conditions/challenges, summary of policy approach, desired outcomes Goals (1-3 per policy topic) Policies (2-4 per goal) Priority Actions (1-2 per policy), Other Actions (1-5 per policy) Maps, Metrics, Indicators

SAMPLE GOAL, POLICY, ACTION LAYOUT

Goal AG 1: Support Diversified Agriculture

Policy AG 1.1

Maintain a healthy and competitive industry with long-term viability that supports a range of different types and scales of agriculture.

The North Shore has a wide range of large, medium, and small-scale agricultural enterprises that require access to viable markets to succeed. They also depend upon a range of inputs, including farm labor, specialized production areas, and technical support.

Priority Action(s):

 Identify and develop convenient, suitable locations in Hale'iwa and/or Waialua, and in Sunset Beach where farmers can market products.
 Allow use of publicly owned land such as Hale'iwa Beach Park and Sunset Beach Neighborhood Park for regularly scheduled farmers market operations.



- Support the expansion and diversification of aquaculture in the region, including the continued clean-up of the former Dillingham Quarry site in Mokulē'ia and expansion of existing aquaculture operations in the area.
- · Identify other potential sites for aquaculture or mariculture parks.
- Support programs for residents and area teens to learn about agricultural practices, economics, and business.
- Support agricultural research and development activities that enhance farming operations.
- Support development of an island-wide comprehensive agricultural plan.



POLICY FRAMEWORK DRAFTING INPUTS



POLICY FRAMEWORK DRAFTING PRINCIPLES

- ✓ Retain as much language and intent from 2011 NSSCP as possible while adapting to new, more action-oriented format
- ✓ Reflect and incorporate CPAC and Community input received to date
- ✓ Incorporate new concerns and planning considerations
- ✓ Integrate updated plans and policies since 2011
- ✓ Keep language high-level and appropriate to a 25-year planning horizon (i.e., avoid project specifics and information that has a "shelf life")
- ✓ Flag "hot button topics" that need further discussion and vetting through the public review and adoption process
- ✓ Review all goals, policies, and actions against draft vision and desired policy outcomes

CPAC ROLE IN POLICY FRAMEWORK REVIEW

- The CPAC provides input to the project team throughout the process and communicates with the greater community
- Members represent a broad range of community interests and perspectives and share personal opinions as well as those of their particular organizations/interest groups
- The CPAC is advisory to the project team and does not have decision-making responsibilities or authority
- CPAC meetings and modules are not open to the public, but minutes and agendas are published on the website
- CPAC members are bound by the Charter of Commitments
- CPAC members can review draft policy direction and provide comments prior to release of the Public Review Draft


